

Easter Celebrations with Margaret – Page 11



In the sleepy little village of Wentworth, a Lady called Margaret resides within a little stone bungalow. Her back window looks out at her friendly neighbours and her front window looks upon the snowdrops that bring whispers of spring.

Margaret has a number of hobbies such as baking, gardening, knitting and gets great comfort from her strong Christian faith, with that in mind we were overjoyed to be able to sit down and interview her for this edition of the spring newsletter.

Would you like to tell us a little bit about yourself? "Well, I have a big family, I am one of 6 siblings, I'm the youngest. I had an idyllic childhood, growing up on the Wentworth estate at Hollin Hall. My grandfather was a Shepherd on the estate, my other grandfather a shepherd in Dorset.

On the small holding we had an orchard which had plum, pear and apple trees, amazing in the spring time. We kept our own chickens and ducks for fresh eggs. We had a horse, a cow and two sheep dogs. I had a wonderful childhood roaming the fields and woods. Betty, my sister and I had a swing in one field we had many happy hours on."

Where did life take you after Hollin Hall? "Me and my family went up to Hoober, my Dad had past in 1941 so we could no longer remain in the small holding.

It was a lovely little cottage, I lived with my Mother, Brother and two sisters, which were to be married in the March and June. My Brother had been in the army and then he decided to go on the passage to Australia and ended up moving to Sydney. Later in life he came home to retire."

Did you Marry and Fall in Love? "No, I never married, I met the love of my life later and we discussed marriage but I was in my 80s by then, I miss him very much. He was Lovely, we got about 12 years together.

We had known each other all our lives, one day I had been watering the plants in the church ground, it was a hot May afternoon. As I was walking out of the church grounds I heard his voice calling my name, he then came to my house for a cup of tea. The next day he brought his Daughter and her husband to visit me and that was it, I was either at his house or he was at mine. We had a lovely time going out for picnics and trips to Chatsworth estate. After our old vicar passed away his wife admitted to me we were the couple he had always wished to Marry, I lost him in 2016, I miss him."

What did you do for work? "I was the wage officer for Rotherham council, I paid wages weekly. I also kept the national records for the council. I enjoyed it but it was stressful. I later enjoyed volunteering at the children's summer club across the road, was lovely to help prepare classes for easter and spring.

How do you feel about life now, years later still in your beloved village? "Well, I'm 97 and my birthday is in October, sometimes being the youngest can be a little disastrous as I've lost my parents and siblings, however I have some incredible nieces and a nephew."

What do you enjoy most about easter? "It's all about Christ for me and him rising from the dead."

What would be your typical way of celebrating easter? "I always enjoy the easter Sunday service when I am able to go. The new vicar is lovely, she's joining me at my home today for communion."
